The Programming homework will consist of programming exercises that you will put in your Dropbox folder, and I will grade. We may also use the online homework system Webwork for just a little bit.
- Late homework is **not** accepted. However, your lowest Programming homework grade will be dropped. I also essentially drop your lowest couple of CodeLab homeworks; in fact I do better: I simply add 5% points to your overall homework score at the end of the semester (though your score can't go above 100%).
