- Before each of the 3 tests, there will be a handwrittn review homework. All 3 of these homeworks will count; none of them will be dropped.

- We will have regular group assignments in class, where you will work with other students in the class. They will be worth 5 points, with a possible grade of 3, 4, or 5.
- If you are not present for a class when a group assignment is handed out, you will receive a 0 for that assignment.
- Your lowest group assignment grade will be dropped.
